It's been a busy 90th year at United Way, as we move forward with effort, determination and effectiveness, even while continuing to navigate the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic. EDUCATION



Our **Dolly Parton's Imagination Library** continues to send books monthly to about 3,000 local children, ages 0-5. **This month, we distributed our 225,000th book!** More than 4,000 five-year-old graduates of our Imagination Library have headed off to Kindergarten with up to 60 books of their own.



What else helps kids begin Kindergarten ready to learn? That's what **Zero to Five Missoula's Kindergarten Entry Assessment** explores. The KEA, the first of its kind in Montana, is examining data from 55 participating classrooms, involving 900 children and their families. The KEA identifies the services, supports and factors that help a child show up at Kindergarten ready to learn and thrive. Launched this fall, the **Parent Leadership Training Institute (PLTI)** enables parents to become leading advocates for children. Parents are motivated and eager to change their children's lives, but too often their opinions and experiences are unheard. HEALTH

Reaching Home: Missoula's 10-Year-Plan to End Homelessness continues to focus on innovative solutions to homelessness in our community. Housing has been increasingly difficult to find in the past year, especially for our poorest and most vulnerable neighbors. Historically low rental vacancy rates, combined with economic challenges, plus increased needs and reduced capacity on the part of the nonprofit sector, have helped create a perfect storm for our unhoused neighbors.

In response, Reaching Home successfully implemented a **Temporary Safe Outdoor Space**: a safe, healthy, secure, staffed (24/7) environment, on private land, that serves people experiencing homelessness during the COVID-19 pandemic who were not accessing existing services or resources. The TSOS can house approximately 40 people at a time; occupancy averages about 22 people. Seventy-five residents have utilized the facility since it opened in December of 2020. Since then, 17 residents have entered long-term housing. All current residents are connected to case management, addressing issues that have contributed to their homelessness. Fifteen residents who lacked proof of identity have secured official IDs, which are critical to accessing jobs and services. Three residents are receiving treatment for substance use disorder.

United Way remains a key player in current discussions as Missoula County and City leadership work to identify longer-term options to offer our unhoused neighbors the opportunity for a safe home. Also, many communities around the state and country are setting up, or considering setting up, similar sanctioned encampments. We have shared our mutual experiences and are learning from each other about best practices in addressing homelessness.

MISSOULA NONPROFIT CENTER

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With nearly 120 members, our **Missoula Nonprofit Center** connects those helping across our community by sharing information, trainings and even affinity discussion groups. Plans are underway for Philanthropy Day 2021 in November, a virtual celebration of giving, during which local philanthropic heroes will be honored. While 2020 and 2021 (to date) programming has been virtual, we're looking forward to more in-person opportunities in the future.

WILDFIRE READY MISSOULA



Our **Wildfire Ready Missoula program** has continued to increase wildfire preparedness by connecting more than 75 property owners with tools and resources to make their homes and property more wildfire-resistant. We partner with Missoula County's Office of Emergency Management to provide a cost-share program that reimburses property owners 50% of the expense of creating safer homes. We're proud to help lead this innovative, community-benefitting work, improving our community resilience for generations to come.
